This self-paced foundations course is an important introductory component of many

where to implement prevention strategies. Using a Geographic Information System (GIS) allows Prevention Professionals to focus on the community context with a robust set of tools supporting data visualization and analysis. *Geospatial Academy for Prevention Professionals* (GAPP) provides the skills necessary to implement geospatial analyses of community data to communicate work to key stakeholders, assess community need, and evidence the impact of prevention initiatives.

GAPP 1 – Introduction to GIS is a fully self-paced, 2.5 hour course that includes instruction on how to download and use QGIS, a free mapping software package.
