



- Objectives
- Strategies
- Action plans



Planning




Things to consider to have a solid prevention plan:

- Prioritize the risk and protective factors associated with the substance misuse problems that have been identified
- Select appropriate programs and practices to address each priority factor
- Combine programs and practices to ensure a comprehensive approach
- Build and share a logic model with stakeholders

Prioritizing Risk and Protective Factors






We have identified our risk and protective factors



Ensure a Comprehensive Approach









Levels of risk

Multiple social contexts

Cultural relevance



Are members of the focus community involved in the planning process?

Health Equity Questions

Will the proposed strategy be a good cultural fit for the community?

Are there additional community capacity and/or readiness concerns to be addressed before implementation?

How do you recruit community members to be involced in the planning process?

I am brand new to prevention. Hoping someone shares some good ideas:) I have used a taskforce of community members for a community wide needs assessment before.

Surveys and, paid focus groups (equitable for their contribution) Using our coalition to facilitate conversations and build relationships in the community.

Pin the process of pulling together an advisory committee

Meeting people where they're at, and building relationships/trust Inviting people to coalition meetings, tabling at community events to share information, and social media outreach.

Attend other community organization's meetings & events. Share what your coalition does with them.



How do you recruit community members to be involced in the planning process?

Invite them to educational conferences/meetings to gain engagement

Surveying the community. Going around the community and introducing ourselves and what we do to the small business in the little town we work at

Attend meetings from other sectors. Get them jazzed up.

I haven't started this yet, but I am currently in the process of establishing a coalition and a youth leadership academy to build relationships with the youth and community.

Actionable steps for applying an Equity lens to the Strategic Prevention Framework – Planning Phase

- Recruit focus population members to help identify appropriate programs and practices
- Convene focus groups with diverse community members to obtain valuable feedback on potential interventions.
- Nothing About Us Without Us: keep aligning with the community in each step of the process
- 'One Size Fits All' doesn't actually fit anyone: ensure you are selecting a program that is effective for the community you are serving and the issue you are addressing
