Great Lakes Prevention Technology Transfer Center: Year 1 in Review (2018–2019)

The Great Lakes Prevention Technology Transfer Center (PTTC) provides training and technical assistance services to the substance use prevention field including professionals/pre-professionals, state agencies, community organizations, and other stakeholders in the prevention community in the six states within HHS Region V: Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Minnesota, Ohio, and Wisconsin. Our

partner is Educational Development Center (EDC), a global nonprofit that advances lasting solutions to improve education, promote health, and expand economic opportunity. We also

work closely with the Great Lakes ATTC and Great Lakes MHTTC, both of which are also at the Center for Health Enhancement Systems Studies (CHESS) at the University of Wisconsin–Madison.

Areas of Focus

Preventing and Reducing Stigma

The Great Lakes PTTC is committed to preventing and reducing the pervasive stigma associated with having, treating, or being in recovery from a substance use disorder. Efforts include:

- Spreading the message that a substance use disorder is a chronic medical condition rather than a moral failing
- Encouraging the use of non-stigmatizing language related to substance use disorders
- Building awareness of anti-stigma initiatives at the community and state levels in the Great Lakes region

Process Improvement in Prevention

The Great Lakes PTTC has adapted the NIATx process improvement model for the prevention audience. In Year 1, we conducted NIATx Change Leader Academies throughout the region focused on the following process improvement aims for prevention:

- 1. Coalition Functioning
 - Increase meeting attendance
 - Increase sector representation
 - Increase number of volunteer hours logged
- 2. Prevention EBP Implementation
 - Increase number of schools using programs
 - Increase number of schools meeting program fidelity standards
 - Increase parent attendance at program sessions
 - Increase parent completion rate of programs with multiple sessions
 - Increase communication reach of messaging media campaign

Our areas of emphasis:

- Naloxone education
- Overdose prevention training
 Anti-stigma training
- Process improvement in behavioral health

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Year One Highlights

During our first year, the Great Lakes PTTC worked to launch our center and focused on building relationships with key stakeholders across the region. In addition to implementing our start-up efforts, we engaged 1,600 individuals through 40 events, which included on-site trainings, intensive technical assistance projects, webinars, meetings, and conference exhibiting. Great Lakes PTTC Topical Working Groups
