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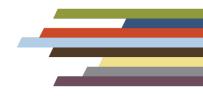

School Year 2020-2021

Goal: Serve 545 youth with Evidence based prevention programs

Successes

- After training and modeling new facilitators
 - BGCWC in 1 school with 2 programs half time, 1 full time. School Health teacher teaches of the other half of classes
 - 1 Intermediate school and 1 Jr. High facilitating all programs and reporting data to our facilities.
- Smaller Class sizes
- Capacity and sustainability increases

- Hybrid Schedule
- Fidelity of 80% attendance
- Keeping facilitators on track

- Schools unsure of reopening plans and not sure how we fit

- Change from hybrid to remote settings
- Engaging students during virtual

Spring 2020

Goal: To prepare materials for online facilitation

Successes

- Created more vibrant and engaging slides via Canva
- Included virtual tools such as Kahoots and Padlets to engage youth
- Created facilitator's notes for all staff to encourage uniformity and consistency

- Planning for the unknown
- Creating slides to accommodate different time frames while still maintaining fidelity
- Anticipating curriculum changes while wanting to also take initiative
- Awaiting communication from school partners

Summer 2020

Goal: To communicate with existing partners

Successes

- Our strongest partners stayed in touch but were still unsure of the need for our partnership
- Flexibility regarding school needs (bell schedule, tech issues, attendance procedures, platforms, homework assignments)

- Lack of communication from some current partners
- Being informed that our services would no longer be needed for FY21

School Year 2020-2021

Goal: Expanding/adapting virtual services to meet deliverables

Successes

- Consistently edited slides
 after each cycle
- Became more inclusive as youth shared more privately
- Used Kahoot data to inform future facilitation (improve our delivery)
- Began using school websites and social media for deliverables

Challenges

- Participation from youth and teachers (cameras off)
- Limited methods of communication to school staff (emails only):

Deliverables: Illinois Youth Surveys, curricula, communication campaigns, youth advisory committees, etc.
