




Alcohol Policy Definition

A combination of Federal, State, and local laws help shape the role alcohol plays in the United States, including how we:

- Manufacture alcohol
- Sell alcohol
- Decide who can drink alcohol
- Respond to alcohol-related problems

Alcohol Policy: Part of a Comprehensive Approach



The Goal of Alcohol Policy

- Decrease negative consequences of excessive alcohol consumption.
- Influence individuals' risky alcohol consumption practices.
- Reduce risk factors associated with alcohol related problems and consequences.
- Develop disincentives for individuals and organizations that contribute to risky alcohol behaviors.

Sample Alcohol Policies

- Regulating alcohol density
- Increasing alcohol taxes
- Dram shop liability
- Limits on day of sale
- Limits on hours of sale
- Electronic Screening and Brief Intervention (eSBI)
- Enhanced enforcement of law prohibiting sales to minors








Alcohol Policy: Understanding Lobbying Fundamentals



What's Lobbying?

- Federal, state, and local lobbying laws may differ significantly.
- Always clarify which level of government and be aware of regulations surrounding it.
- School boards can be an exception.



Contemplating Lobbying: Things to Consider

What is **NOT** Lobbying



Providing legislative updates to coalition members and partners



Mass communication through speech, article, publication or other material.



Testimony given before congress or submitted for inclusion in the public record.

What is <u>NOT</u> Lobbying, cont.



Providing written in response to request



Providing a response to a request for public comments.



Anything required by subpoena or through civil investigative demand.




Providing information through the media: interviews, op-eds, etc.


Lobbying Summary

- Advocacy and Lobbying have different roles to play
- Consider those who are best positioned for each role (research, media relations, community empowerment, etc.)
- Lobbying is critical but relationships with your own legislators can be more important.

Planning Policy: Action Steps



- Identify the Problem in the Community
- Build Leadership Buy-in
- Determine Where to Make Change
- Determine Decision Makers

Step 1: Identify the Problem

Use Assessment Data Use Consider who is most impacted and Consider engage them Deploy all the tools available to Deploy understand the problem

Building an Equity Lens

Involve those who are...


- most impacted by excessive alcohol use,
- victims of alcohol related violence, injuries and harms, and
- negatively impacted by excessive alcohol use.



Cultural Humility

- Determine the best way to approach partners.
- Ensure information provided is culturally responsive.
- Take time to build relationships and to get to know potential partners.
- Use a culturally humble approach when working with partners.

Step 2: Build Leadership Buy-In



Step 3: Determine Where to Make Policy Change

Be clear on what your goal is meant to change:

Government?

- Local
- State
- Federal
- System change (Sector change or within health care, school, etc.)?

Step 4: Determine Who Are the Decision Makers

- Get familiar with the decision-makers
- Subscribe to newsletters
- Follow on social
- Keep track of the news
