



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

The HEAAL membership uses the Strategic Prevention Framework model, 7 Strategies for Community Change, and the 6 CSAP Prevention Strategies to implement prevention strategies throughout the community.








Dribble 4 cancer was a special event where community came together to spread awareness about cancer and to raise funds to find a cure.

Individual And Collective Risk/Protective Factors

98.40%

increase in parent/child conversations about stress and healthy coping strategies.

78.03%

increase in parent/caregiver report of youth utilization of mindfulness activities.

20.6%

decrease in the number of African American youth in our service area indicating that they are using to cope with stress, and a **30.3%** decrease in these youth saying that they are using to cope with sadness.

98.8%

increase in the number of African American youth in our service areas indicating that they did not use the target substances in the past 30 days due to perceived harm, and a **30.2%** increase in the number of these youth saying that they did not use due to parent disapproval.




increase in youth reporting that they did not use substances in the past **30 days** due to perceived risk of physical harm.



Outcome Highlights

29.5%

A **29.5%** increase in youth reporting that they did not use substances in the past **30 days** due to perceived risk of physical harm

47.5%

Emerging trends: **47.5%** increase in youth awareness of the dangers of fentanyl; youth vaping is now 53.6% lower than the state rate

14.8%

A **14.8%** increase in youth who report that parent/caregivers are talking to them about the risks of substance use and a **38.9%** increase in parents reporting having more frequent conversations about the risks



14.8%

A **14.8%** increase in youth who report that parent/caregivers are talking to them about the risks of substance use and a **38.9%** increase in parents reporting having more frequent conversations about the risks

13.0% and 9.0%

A **13.0% and 9.0%** increase in parent/caregivers monitoring and properly storing prescription drugs and alcohol kept in the home, respectively

10.1%

A **10.1%** increase in youth knowledge about effective resistance strategies and a corresponding **95.9%** increase in youth utilizing these skills when offered substances.



Additional Outcomes

133.3%

increase in community awareness of how to access naloxone

119.8%

increase in community knowledge of overdose reversal methods


32.4%

increase in knowledge gain on the factors that mitigate or reduce the likelihood of suicide in our community 28.6%

increase in knowledge gain on factors affecting youth and adult suicide among our community members

A multitude of barriers related to physical and mental health inequalities and accessing mental health, substance use and suicide prevention were also identified in these data and are being used to guide additional community assessment and ongoing prevention strategies in our community

The evidence of outcomes of interest is taken from data collected from the Arizona Youth Survey, Community Views Survey and programmatic pre-post surveys.


