The 2020 census provides filters to describe veterans by geographic location (e.g., state, county, and subdivisions). Review tables of interest and select one. Select Geos < County < All Counties within United States and Puerto Rico < Select X to exit the window. Select Year: 2021 Select the link below DOWNLOAD TABLE to Open the Table. Select Transpose so counties are in the left margin. Select Excel. Select the link again below Download Table to open the table. Select the Excel icon to download. View Data tab and counties and variables of interest. Files will need to be cleaned before analysis.
