<p>Census 2020 (Demographics). Every 10 years, the U.S. Census Bureau will attempt to count everyone in the United States on April 1, regardless of their nationality or sexual orientation. The 2020 Census will give people the option to identify a relationship as same sex. Responses from the lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, or queer (LGBTQ+) community, a historically undercounted community, will provide reliable data to inform advocates, policymakers, and researchers working on LGBTQ+ issues.</p>	<p>https://www.census.gov/en.html</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. <p>Movement Advancement Project (Equity/Policy). The Movement Advancement Project (MAP) tracks over 50 different LGBTQ-related laws and policies. This map shows the overall policy tallies (as distinct from sexual orientation or gender identity tallies) for each state, the District of Columbia, and the five populated U.S. territories. A state’s policy tally scores the laws and policies within each state that shape LGBTQ people’s lives, experiences, and equality. The major categories of laws covered by the policy tally include Relationship & Parental Recognition, Nondiscrimination, Religious Exemptions, LGBTQ Youth, Health Care, Criminal Justice, and Identity Documents.</p>	<p>https://www.lgbtmap.org/</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. Select Youth Online Data Analysis Tool, High School YRBS, and GO. 2. Select desired state and GO. 3. Select from the drop-down menu Unintentional Injuries and Violence and scroll down to select Being Sad or Hopeless. 4. Select all race/ethnicity, all grades. 5. View Data by Subgroup and select Sexual orientation for Column Variable and Sex for Row Variable 1. Leave Row Variable 2. NO SELECTION. Select GO. 6. To the right of Display Options, select Export to Excel.
